About the Bachelor of Social Work

Social Workers have the opportunity to change the lives of individuals and families as well as improve the quality of life in the communities they serve. The Bachelor of Social Work (BSW) at LSU focuses on preparing students for entry-level careers in social service agencies, schools, corrections and criminal justice departments, and the military. In particular, active faculty research projects in addictive disorders, behavioral health, child attachment, child welfare, criminal justice, gerontology, HIV, LGBT studies, poverty, provide our students the unique opportunity to learn about the many social justice challenges in our community and as well as the major social problems in Louisiana and the nation.

The U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS, 2017) expects social work jobs to increase at a rate of 12 percent between 2014 and 2024. This faster-than-average growth rate indicates positive employment prospects for students in this field.

The BSW major courses build upon a general liberal arts foundation obtained during the first two years at the university. These general education courses prepare students for the two years of concentrated courses that teach professional competencies delineated by the Council of Social Work Education. One of the strengths of the Bachelor of Social Work degree is the 480 hours of fieldwork required during the last semester of study. This practice based educational approach offers the student the opportunity to transfer knowledge gained in the classroom to skills working with individuals, families, groups, organizations, and communities. The LSU School of Social Work has good relationships with hundreds of community agencies where students work under the supervision of a licensed social worker.

BSW ADMISSION REQUIREMENTS

The student must be admissible to the College of Human Sciences & Education (CHSE) as follows...

Have earned at least 24 semester hours

Have a cumulative and LSU GPA of 2.5 or higher

Have completed English 1001, Math 1021, and Social Work 2000 with a C or better

BSW APPLICATION PROCESS

Applicants must submit a BSW application to the College of Human Sciences & Education in 236 Peabody Hall. Applications may be found at Isu.edu/bsw and also at Isu.edu/chse/applications. Applicants must include a letter of recommendation from a faculty member or academic counselor/advisor. Priority admission is February 2018. Professional classes in the School of Social Work start in the Fall of 2018.
