CMST 1061: Fundamentals of Communication

This course educates students on the three areas of communication studies which includes rhetoric, performance, and communication theory.

CMST 2060: Public Speaking

This course introduces students to the theory and practice of informative, persuasive, and ceremonial speaking.

CMST 3107: Rhetoric of Contemporary Media

This course helps students examine our changing value systems as they are reflected in television shows from 1950 to present day. Students also become acquainted with the social, political, and economic environments surrounding these shows.

TEACHING PHILOSOPHY

I believe that teaching is more than just a career choice. For me, teaching is an extension of who I am. I love learning and I love sharing what I have learned with others. I am thrilled when my students continue this trend by sharing things they have learned in my class with their friends and family members. A student of mine once told me that he made his girlfriend take the communication survey he took in class so they could understand more about how they each viewed communication, and could, in turn, learn to communicate more effectively with each other.

I believe that teaching and learning are not restricted to the classroom. I want my students to learn through doing. Reading and listening to lectures is certainly one way to learn, but I believe learning is more effective when students can put the concepts into practice. Along with many in-class activities, I have each student keep a learning portfolio throughout the semester. The entries in this portfolio ask them to reflect on and write about how they have used the concepts of communication in their day-to-day lives. My wish is that, even after they leave my class, they will recognize how these concepts continue to play out in their personal and professional lives.

I believe that I can learn from my students as much as they can learn from me. There have been many instances in my classroom where I have walked out knowing more than I did when I walked in. During one of my lectures on the opening theme of the TV show, *Maude*, a student brought up the idea that it seemed, to him, the African-American singers were using a technique used by plantation slaves where they would sing coded messages that insulted the master of the plantation, but sounded praiseworthy on the surface. I researched this point when I left class and was able to add a whole new dimension to my lecture. I give him credit for bringing this to my attention each semester that I teach this class.

Finally, I believe that every student is an individual. It is a personal goal of mine to learn the name of each student in my class. I try to address them by name when answering their questions or when calling on them for a response. I want them to feel that they are an important part of the education process and not just a nameless face in the crowd. Teaching and learning are flip-sides of the same coin. I get a rush of excitement at the start of each semester because I know I will be meeting a new group of students with whom to share the educational experience.
