COURSE DESCRIPTION/GOALS

CMST 2060 is a *General Education Humanities Course* designed to familiarize students with the study of public speaking. The act of public speaking is the culmination (and often the beginning) of a long process of critical dialogue between oneself, language, and the imagined responses of the audience. In other words, it takes being confident in who you are, what you want to say, how you are going to say it, who you want to say it to, and why you should say anything at all. Throughout the semester, students will be introduced to the fundamental concepts of public speaking.

As a General Education Humanities Course, CMST 2060 will enable students to demonstrate an understanding of historical, cultural, and philosophical complexity that supports sophisticated discourse.

Please note that this course is not about influencing your personal politics, but this course will often ask you to engage in political concepts and current events. This being said, you will in no way be graded based on your political opinions. However, you may be graded on your organization of such opinions based on the speech rubrics.

As stated, we will encounter hot topics throughout this course. In order to maintain the *safe space* of our classroom, if you become uncomfortable during a peer's speech please feel free to quietly exit the room and return once the speech is over.

COURSE POLICIES

Attendance & Participation: This is a highly interactive, in class activity-based course, so attendance at every class session is expected. Being a public speaking course, your participation and engagement with the material and one another is also expected. If you anticipate missing a lot of class, this is not the course or section for you. However, you are allowed 2 no-questions asked freebies for the semester. Once your freebies are used, absences will be counted against your Activity Speeches/In-Class Activity grade.

If you feel that you are struggling, have any questions, or want to run a topic idea by me please do not hesitate to attend my office hours. I am here to help!

Technology Policy: You will lose participation points for using unwarranted technology.

- Laptops/Tablets are not permitted in class unless explicitly told they are going to be a tool for collaborative learning. You should have paper and a writing utensil for this course.
- Phones are **NOT** permitted for use during class. Use in class will lead to deduction in points (5 per class day)
- In emergencies requiring cell phone access during class (which you have made me aware of prior to class) you should attempt to sit near the entrance to the classroom.

Plagiarism: You are to assume that all assignments in this course are individual assignments unless explicit instructions are provided for a group project. Any student found to have turned in material not their own (either downloaded from the internet or written by another student) in part or in whole will immediately be reported to the Dean of Students. The Internet has made plagiarism very easy and very tempting (although it has also made it rather easy to test for plagiarized work). Hundreds of sites offer papers, research, writing, and editing. The ease with which such material is available over the Internet does not lessen the seriousness of claiming material from the Internet as your own. See the LSU policies on

plagiarism here: <http://www.lib.lsu.edu/instruction/plagiarism2.html>. Your speech is considered as plagiarized in part or entirely if you do any of the following:

- Submit a paper or speech that was written by someone other than you.
- Submit a paper or speech in which you use the ideas, metaphors or reasoning style of another, but do not cite that source and/or place that source in your list of references. Simply rewording a sentence does not make work your own.
- Submit a paper or speech in which you “cut and paste” or use the exact words of a source and you do not put the words within quotation marks, use footnotes or in-text citations, and place the source in your list of references.

Disabilities: The Americans with Disabilities Act and the Rehabilitation Act of 1973 states: “If you have a disability that may have some impact on your work in this class and for which you may require accommodations, please see a coordinator in the Office of Disability Affairs (112 Johnston Hall) so that such accommodations can be arranged.” After you receive the accommodation letters, please meet with me to discuss the provisions of those accommodations.

Grades: Final grades will be determined based on points earned on the following assignments. All work must be done during the semester. I reserve the right to make minor adjustments in the points offered to maintain flexibility of our course schedule. Rubrics will be posted/handed out prior to each assignment.

“A” means you have **excelled** in your performance or written work, expending special time and energy to make something you well know is impressive.

“B” means you have completed all assignments **and** have gone the extra step beyond. “B” indicates that you have thoroughly prepared, followed the assignment requirements, and made the audience/reader interested in your work.

“C” means you have successfully accomplished the assignments and are able to construct and deliver a solid performance or written assignment, but have not put in the kind of extra time and energy that distinguishes your work from the average effort.

“D” and “F” indicate you have not met the basic criteria of assignments and/or you have turned in or presented deficient work.

Course Assignments:

4 Major Speeches (50% of overall course grade):

Introductory Speech (5% - 50 points)

Informative Speech (15% - 150 points)

Persuasive Speech (20% - 200 points)

Commemorative Speech (10% - 100 points)

-As will be laid out in more detail in each rubric, writing such as outlines and self-assessments will be a portion of each speech grade.

Research Participation Requirement (3% - 30 points)

In-Class Activities (12% - 120 points)

Reading Assessments (15% - 150 points)

Exams (20% of overall course grade):

Your final grade will be based on your total score at the end of the semester.

Missed Speeches & Late-Work: If a student is absent the day she/he is scheduled to speak and has not made prior arrangements with the instructor, the presentation will suffer at 10% deduction. If a speaker knows well in advance that they cannot attend class the day of an assigned speech presentation, they can find a replacement without penalty. If the speaker is too sick to present then stay home, but a note from the health center is required.

Any short homework assignments are to be completed prior to class and turned in at the beginning of class on the day that they are due. If you email asking to turn in late work due to a university excused absence, submit documentation of your excuse along with your inquiry about an extension.

ASSIGNMENT DESCRIPTIONS

Major Speeches:

- 1) Introductory Speech: a 3-4 min narrative based speech addressing your own experiences. The specific topic is TBD.
- 2) Informative Speech: a 5 min informative speech on a predetermined broad theme. The specific topic is TBD.
- 3) Persuasive Speech: a 6-7 min persuasive speech. For this speech you will be divided into pairs and will each give a persuasive speech on the same topic but opposing sides. This speech will be filmed.
- 4) Commemorative Speech: a 2-3 min commemorative or open topic speech

In-Class Activities: This grade will be determined based on in-class participation, and in-class speaking exercises.

Reading Assessments: These assessments will be assigned and accessible via Connect. You will read the assigned chapters and take the assigned quizzes.

Midterm and Final Exams: The midterm exam will be a 3-4 page speech analysis paper. The final will be a traditional multiple choice/ true-false style exam.

Research Participation System (RPS): A department requirement. You are responsible for completing this requirement, and the grading is out of my hands.

The material you will learn in this course is the product of research. The goal of the research learning requirement is to help you to gain knowledge about the process by which scholars attempt to understand human behavior. All students taking CMST 1061, 2010, 1150, and 2060 must complete a research learning requirement. For each course in which a student is enrolled, he or she must complete 2 research credits. You can fulfill your requirement by:

1. Participating in research studies conducted in the Department of Communication Studies. All studies that last between 0 and 30 minutes will count as one credit. Any study that lasts between 31 and 60 minutes will count as two credits. Each study will specify the number of credits a student can earn for completion. There will be several survey and experimental studies conducted throughout the semester. These studies are held on campus at various times and in various locations or are administered through online survey software. All available studies are approved by the Institutional Review Board at LSU.

2. Participating in an organized departmental function such as debate or public speaking

Competition. Only departmental sanctioned events will count toward a student's research learning requirement; thus, no credit will be given for a student attending an outside speaker or performance.

3. **Serving as a research assistant for a faculty member in the Department of Communication Studies.** The number of units and requirements for those units will be set by the researcher and either accepted or rejected by the student. The research learning requirement is worth 3% of your total grade; you will receive your 3% if you accumulate 2 research credits during the given semester.

Please note that all research learning credits must be completed and allocated by Monday, November 27, at 11:59 PM

ALL available options to earn credit are posted on an electronic bulletin board located at <https://lsuhumanresearch.sona-systems.com/Default.aspx?ReturnUrl=/>. When you go to this website, you will first have to request an account. Once you have secured an account, you will be able to log in and see the options available to you for your various CMST courses.

Please note that **various ways to fulfill your research learning requirement will appear on this bulletin board throughout the semester.** You are encouraged to check the system on a regular basis for current credit options that fit your interests as well as your schedule.

It is very important that when you sign-up for a credit option that you attend that option or cancel your sign up. **Failure to show up twice during one semester will result in your access to the system being restricted and you being unable to complete your research learning requirement.** Valid excuses for failing to cancel a sign up and missing a credit option are the same as those found in LSU Policy Statement 31.
